



Father Clancy was born in Freehold, New Jersey, son of the late Joseph F. And Anne Collins Clancy. St. Rose of Lima was his home parish and he attended the Parish School for eight years before attending the local High School. College years were divided between St. Charles, Catonsville, Maryland and Seton Hall University at the latter of which a Bachelor of Arts Degree Cum laude was received in 1937.

Three years.later Father entered Immaculate Conception Seminary, Darlington, New Jersey being ordained from there on March 17, 1945, by Bishop William A. Griffin in St. Mary's Cathedral, Trenton.

For sixteen and one half years of service to the Diocese as an associate were in Ss. Peter and Paul, Trenton, St. Peter's, New Brunswick, Holy Spirit, Asbury Park, St. Mary's South Amboy, and Blessed Sacrament, Trenton and then in December 1961 his first Pastorate brought him to Our Lady, Queen of

Peace, Hainesport and after five years there the Bishop transferred him to St. Joseph's Bound Brook in February 1967.

During a Pastorate of eight and one half years at St. Joseph's a new Church was built and dedicated in February 1971. The rectory was relocated in a house purchased near the site of the new Church and major repairs to and enlargement of the old rectory, to be used as a convent, were made. The old convent was razed to make room for the new Church. A music director was hired and a full time Religious Education Coordinator. A Parish Council was instituted. The Parish School prospered under the able direction and dedication of the good Sisters of Mercy. It was a time of challenge and a great deal of team work on the part of the parishioners.

Now stationed in Hopewell since August 1975, the highlight has been the preparations for and observance of St. Alphonsus' centennial celebration. October 16, 1977, will be a memorable date for generations to come.

Right Reverend Michael J. O'Farrell, D.D. First Bishop of Trenton Consecrated Nov. 1, 1881 Died April 2, 1894



History of

ST. ALPHONSUS PARISH

The present parish of Hopewell began its existence in 1874 when the Reverend Thomas R. Moran of St. Paul's, Princeton, came twice a year (in the spring and in the fall) to say Mass at the home of Daniel and Hannah Reardon on their farm along the Province Line Road, Besides the Reardon family, there came also the families of Edward Brophy, Patrick Cashel, Michael Norton, Stephen King, Miles Carney, James Shelby, and Daniel Kerwin. For many years before this, the scattered Catholics of this area attended church at Lambertville or Princeton. The church records show that many of them were faithful and regularly attended at Princeton. Around this time the above named men had a meeting with Bishop Michael A. Corrigan of Newark to intercede for their own church.

About 1876 Father Moran began to take up subscriptions for a church, and during this period services were held for several months in the home of Michael and Ellen Norton on Columbia Avenue.

Later in the year of 1876 Father Anthony Smith of the Cathedral took charge of the Hopewell Mission, and as a consequence of the previous meeting with Bishop Corrigan, Father Smith purchased the lot where the Church now stands. Early in the summer of 1877 the covered basement was completed, and the first Mass was said on July 11, 1877, at which time Bishop Corrigan laid the cornerstone and preached for the occasion. Father Michael Holland, an assistant at the Cathedral, had charge of Hopewell at this time, and he worked hard to advance the building, which was completed within a few years at a cost of \$5,000.00.

Lectures and concerts were held and much local talent developed. Too much credit cannot be given to Edward Brophy and Daniel Reardon for the interest they took in the work. Father Holland was followed by the Reverend James A. McFaul, an assistant at the Cathedral. Father McFaul was succeeded by Father Fox. The mission then passed to Father Bernard T. O'Connell of Bound Brook, who attended it semi-monthly. The parish at Hopewell remained in charge of St. Mary's Cathedral until 1883, when it was transferred to the charge of Father Lawler, pastor of Dunellen. Later on another change was made, and the Hopewelll Mission was attended from Bound Brook. Again Hopewell was a mission to St.Mary's, and had as many changes of pastors as the Cathedral had assistants; Father Gammel, Father O'Reilly, Father O'Farrell, Father Cunningham, and Father Ward, until finally the parish received its first resident pastor in the person of the Reverend Joseph Keuper on January 21, 1894, who also assumed charge of the Princeton and Lawrenceville Missions.

Father Keuper purchased the first organ and organized a choir, much to the delight of the people, and he resided for a while with Mr. and Mrs. Miles Carney on Princeton Avenue, Hopewell, and subsequently at St. Mary's Cathedral. He was in charge about eight months when he was promoted to Mount Holly, and Father J. Murphy succeeded him at Hopewell in October, 1894; then Father Murphy was succeeded by Father M. J. Hagerty in February, 1896, and Father Hagerty remained here until August, 1896, and was succeeded by Father Thomas J. O'Hanlon until August, 1899. Father O'Hanlon was succeeded by Father William F. Dunphy who remained here until September, 1901, and was followed by Father Thomas A. Maloney, O.S.A., a missionary en route from Australia to Ireland. Father Maloney was here at the time of the assassination of President William McKinley in September, 1901, and memorial services were held in the Hopewell Baptist Church, at which time Father Maloney sang, "Lead Kindly Light." Father Maloney remained at St. Alphonsus until September, 1902, when he was replaced by Father Peter J. Clune, who stayed here until March of 1903.

NOTE: Portions of the above information were taken from a book entitled, **History of the Diocese of Trenton**, written by the Reverend Walter T. Leahy, published in 1906 by the Princeton University Press, Princeton, N.J. This book was dedicated to the Right Reverend James A. McFaul, D.D., L.L.D., Second Bishop of Trenton, N. J.

A search of the records at the Mercer County Clerk's Office, Court House, Trenton, N. J. discloses that the name of "Saint Alphonsus Catholic Church" was incorporated December 22, 1876 under the laws of the State of New Jersey, and the Certificate of Incorporation was signed by the "Right Reverend Michael A. Corrigan, Bishop of the Diocese of Newark, the Very Reverend George H. Doane, Vicar-General of the said Diocese, the Reverend Anthony Smith, Pastor of the Roman Catholic Church (now known as Saint Alphonsus Catholic Church) and Edward Brophy and Patrick Cashel, two lay members of the said Church." The Certificate of Incorporation was recorded January 2, 1877 in the Mercer County Clerk's Office in Book "A" of Corporations on pages 204 and 205.

The records at the Mercer County Clerk's Office also disclose that Saint Alphonsus Catholic Church purchased the land containing 2.24 acres more or less on December 28, 1876 from Samuel W. Taylor and Catharine Taylor, his wife, for the sum of \$632.00. The said deed is recorded in Volume 114 of Deeds on page 341.

In November, 1881, the Holy Father, Pope Leo XIII, then reigning over the universal Church, divided the Diocese of Newark taking fourteen counties away from it to form a new diocese, and the episcopal See was established at Trenton, making the Right Reverend Michael J. O'Farrell its first Bishop.

Father Clune was succeeded at St. Alphonsus by Father Reddan, who was here for a short while in 1905, and was replaced by Father James J. Powers who remained here until September, 1911. Father John A. Kucker was here for a few months from June until September of 1911 during the illness of Father Powers. Then followed in succession Father Edward C. Manion until April, 1914; Father Peter B. Corr until January, 1915; Father John A. Caulfield until April, 1917; Father Hugh L. Massey until March, 1919; and then Father John J. West until May, 1926.

ST. ALPHONSUS' ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH HOPEWELL.

Previous to the erection of this church services were held by the Catholics for several months in the house of Michael Norton, who with Edward Proney and Edward Cashel and others was among the constituent members of St. Alphonsus' Church.

A lot containing three acres was purchased, and the erection of a house of worship was begun in 1874. The corner-store was laid by Bishop M.A. Corrigan, of Newark, who, assisted by Rev. Anthony Smith, of Trenton, blessed the church upon its completion. It is a frame building, thirty-six feet by seventy-two, and cost five thousand dollars, and with other property connected therewith is valued at seven thousand dollars.

It was under the management of Rev. Anthony Smith, of Trenton, that this congregation was organized. It is dependent upon St. Mary's Catholic Church of Trenton, of which Rev. Anthony Smith is pastor, and has been ministered to by Revs. Michael Holland and J. A. McFaul.

St. Michael's Home, Hopewell, had always been synonymous with St. Alphonsus, as all the pastors at St. Alphonsus also served as chaplains at St. Michael's. St. Michael's Orphanage had been planned by the Right Reverend Bishop O'Farrell, who purchased the VanDyke farm near Hopewell for this purpose, but death carried him away before he had a chance to start the building. Bishop O'Farrell left a bequest of \$60,000 as the nucleus of a fund for the orphans' home. Colonel Daniel Morris later added \$50,000. Bishop McFaul, second Bisop of Trenton, began the erection of St. Michael's Home for Orphans on October 18, 1896, which was completed and dedicated by Bishop McFaul on May 30, 1898, and placed in charge of the Sisters of St. Francis. To increase the self-supporting capacity of the Home, Bishop McFaul purchased the Drake farm of 150 acres. The Home was under the direct supervision of the Bishop, aided by a Board of Governors. The chaplains gave every reasonable attention to the welfare of the growing boys and girls as the chaplains or pastors resided at St. Michael's, with the result that the orphanage required so much of the pastor's time that the parish became the orphan.


St. Michael's Home

It was during the pastorate of the late Father West that St. Michael's had its famous boys' band under the direction and leadership of Father West and the late Martin Mayer, noted band conductor. In those days no parade was complete unless the band participated. Plans were made on June 29, 1973 to demolish this outstanding landmark, and unfortunately St. Michael's Home was razed shortly thereafter.






Bishop George W. Ahr with the last graduating class from St. Michael's — June, 1972

Father West was responsible for the installation of our beautiful leaded stained glass windows in St. Alphonsus during 1921, many of which were donated by the faithful and dedicated parishioners, and many were given in memory of their dearly departed ones. The Sodality of the Blessed




Virgin Mary was very active during that time, comprising approximately forty members, and they held a dance to raise money for their window of "St. Alphonsus." Two windows were installed in honor of the parish boys who served their country in World War I.

In May of 1926 Father West was transferred to New Brunswick, and he was replaced by Father Michael A. Dalton, and like Father West, Father Dalton proved to be a great leader in the spiritual and social welfare of the parishioners. Because of the untiring efforts of these two priests, and the loyal and faithful members, the annual church picnic was always a huge success, financially as well as socially. Hundreds of people came from all the surrounding area to attend this event and partake of an old fashioned church supper with all the trimmings, amusements, various games, and dancing. These picnics continued for many years and helped build a substantial treasury.

Father Dalton was transferred to Camden early in 1935 and he was succeeded by Father Salvatore R. DiLorenzo, who was here for a brief period and he was succeeded by Father Edward A. McKenna in June of 1935. Father McKenna changed the altar into a liturgical altar complete with red velvet draperies and canopy, and after two years Father was transferred to Camden in July, 1937, and was succeeded by Father James F. McGrath, who was here for a short time.

Father McGrath was replaced by Father John F. Thompson as pastor, and during the year 1949 the Most Reverend Moses E. Kiley, then Bishop of Trenton, decided to make a change in the residential status of the pastor in that



the pastor should devote his full time to St. Alphonsus. Plans were immediately drawn by Architect Frank J. Ricker of West New York, N. J. for a rectory to be built on the church property on East Prospect Street; it was to contain twelve rooms and have a brick facing. The bid was awarded to Bregenzer Brothers of Hopewell, and the rectory was completed on October 18, 1940 at a cost of \$12,101.95, completely free of debt.




Completed Rectory - 1940

Since the completion and residency of the pastor at the rectory, the parishioners then had ready access to their pastor, and daily Mass was said in the Church in addition to the Sunday Masses.


Father Thompson accomplished much work, initiating several organizations for spiritual and social purposes, but unfortunately his health started failing, and the parishioners were greatly saddened by his death on November 3, 1960, after having served us for twenty-three years. He was laid to rest in the parish cemetery at the site of the crucifix, in accordance with his wishes. Following Father Thompson's death, Father Francis McCusker was appointed administrator, and he was here for a few months when he was transferred to Cinnaminson, and was succeeded by Father Raymond T. Hurley as administrator, and he remained here for a short period.

Father Edward J. O'Connell was appointed pastor in April, 1962, having been transferred here from Deal, N.J. Father O'Connell was an able spiritual leader who accomplished a lot during his pastorate. He was responsible for having the church re-wired, the walls re-plastered and painted, the church braced, and the steeple repaired. Father O'Connell also purchased a new Baldwin Electronic organ in December, 1963, then removed the canopy and draperies, the altar and wrought-iron communion railing; Father erected a small altar for the tabernacle, installed panelling behind the altar, and had a small altar built in order to say Mass facing the congregation in accordance with the required changes.

During Father O'Connell's pastorate, the Reverend Ernest Bartell, C. S. C., was in residence at St. Alphonsus during 1965 and 1966 and while here completed work on his Ph.D in economics at Princeton and also held a junior faculty position in the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs. Father Bartell left St. Alphonsus to take a faculty position at Notre Dame University, where he remained until 1971 when he was appointed President of Stonehill College in Massachusetts.

About a month after Father Bartell left, Reverend Don McNeill, C.S.C. was given permission to establish his residence at St. Alphonsus while also studying at Princeton. He is now a member of the faculty at the University of Notre Dame. One of the highlights during Father McNeill's residency was a visit by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Don McNeill. "Don McNeill" will be remembered as the host on the "Breakfast Club" program broadcast weekly from Florida. The young, the elderly, and the clergymen of Hopewell Borough attended Mass that particular Sunday afternoon, and the scriptural readings were given by "Don McNeill." Mass was followed by a reception in the church hall and refreshments were served by the Rosarians.

Father O'Connell remained at St. Alphonsus until June, 1969 when he was appointed pastor at St. Magdalen's in Flemington, N.J., and he was succeeded by the Reverend Joseph M. Krysztofik, who was transferred here from Manville. Father Benedict A. Drozdowski was appointed associate pastor in September, 1969 and remained here until July, 1970 when he was transferred to Passaic, N.J. Father Benedict was succeeded as associate by the Reverend James Meszaros, who was here for a brief period and was transferred to Medford Lakes. Father Krysztofik remained here until September, 1971, when the Bishop appointed him pastor of the Sacred Heart Church in Manville, N.J.

Father Krysztofik was succeeded by the Reverend Eugene V. Davis, who was transferred here from the Blessed Sacrament Church in Trenton, and remained here as pastor until June, 1975 when he was transferred to St. John's in Allentown, N.J. Father Eugene Schellberg, on vacation from the faculty of St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Edison, N.J. replaced Father Davis, and he remained as administrator until August 20, 1975 when Father Frederick J. Clancy was appointed pastor, having been transferred from St. Joseph's Church in Bound Brook.

In October, 1975, Father Clancy called a meeting of the parishioners in an attempt to discover the potentials of the parish and to try to implement some of the ideas that would give us more of a community relationship. In Father Clancy's words: "To belong to a parish means more than going to Mass on Sundays and being in good standing as to one's worthiness to receive the Sacraments. Parishioners must become involved in church activities, as apathy is the principal factor that prevents a parish from coming into its own. Whatever we contribute, however great or small, redounds to the fuller and more effective sharing of our heritage."

At subsequent meetings, discussion centered on these topics: sale of commemorative prints of the church to celebrate our 100th anniversary, the erection and completion of a cyclone fence surrounding the cemetery, church improvements, plans for an annual picnic, the re-activation of the CYO and the acquisition of land from the Diocese of Trenton for a possible parish center. These well-attended meetings are held every third Thursday of the month.

Father Clancy and his lay trustees, Angelo N. Castoro and Walter J. Chartier head a committee of industrious parishioners who have completed the renovation of the church hall by removing the old ceiling, exposing the original beams, installing a new lighting system, painting the walls, and by renovating the kitchen. The committee completed this project for our anniversary celebration, the fence has been installed, and eighteen acres of land are being acquired from the Diocese of Trenton.

Our pastor added a new living room on the first floor of the rectory and constructed a two-car garage. Father Clancy's ultimate goal is to raise sufficient funds for the construction of a parish social center for the benefit of the young and elderly parishioners

Our latest census disclosed that we have approximately five hundred families, and have one Saturday afternoon Mass and four Masses on Sunday to accommodate our parishioners.

One of the institutions served by our parish is the New Jersey Neuro-Psychiatric Institute in Skillman. Our parish priest takes care of the spiritual needs of the patients and personnel at the Institute. For the past thirty-five years, our pastor has been assisted there by the Franciscan Conventual Fathers, the Polish Capuchins, the Italian Capuchins and the Vincentians from St. Joseph's Seminary in Kingston, N. J.

CHURCH RECORDS

The statistical records of St. Alphonsus from its early years until early in 1894 were kept on file at St. Mary's Cathedral, Trenton, N. J., and unfortunately these records were completely destroyed in the fire that took the lives of the Right Reverend Msgr. Richard T. Crean and two housekeepers, Miss Mary Brennan and Miss Mary Donnellan on March 14, 1956.

Accordingly, the earliest records on file at St. Alphonsus show the Sacrament of Baptism being administered in the year 1894.

FORMER PASTORS

Father was ordained on June 3, 1950 in the first class ordained by Bishop Ahr of Trenton.

Father's first pastorate was at St. Alphonsus on June 25, 1969 through September 24, 1971, when he was appointed pastor of Sacred Heart Church in Manville, N. J.

Father was appointed pastor at St. Alphonsus in September, 1971 and left June, 1975 when he was transferred as associate pastor at St. John's, Allentown.


Associate Pastor



Father was ordained March 17, 1945 in St. Mary's Cathedral, Trenton, by Bishop Griffin, and served four years at Sacred Heart Church until 1949 when he was assigned as chaplain at St. Michael's Home and remained there until June 12, 1959 when he was appointed pastor and founder of St. Bartholomew's Church in East Brunswick, where a new church, rectory, school and convent were completed.

Rev. Philip T. Matera was born in Trenton, N. J. on July 10, 1925, and attended parochial schools in Trenton, the Society of the Catholic Apostolate in Hammonton, N. J. and Sag Harbor, Long Island, Gregorian University in Rome and completed his studies in Sacred Theology at St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore, Md.

Father was ordained on May 19, 1951 at St. Mary's Cathedral, Trenton, by Bishop Ahr.

Father served as assistant at Holy Trinity Church, Long Branch, Phillipsburg, Iselin, and several places throughout the diocese. Father Matera served as chaplain at St. Michael's from 1962 until 1963.



ST. ALPHONSUS SOCIAL CLUB

This Club was organized during 1940 with Nicholas S. Castoro as the leader, and socials were held every Sunday evening in the church hall; the young teen-agers were taught dancing to the tunes of the old "juke" box; and the parents and grandparents spent the evenings playing cards.

In 1941 the Club entered a float in the local Memorial Day Parade and took first prize much to the delight and satisfaction of the members. Card parties were held in the homes of the different parishioners, and sociability was at its highest.

However, after the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941, most of the young men either enlisted or were called into the armed services; "going away" parties were held for each young man and young woman as he or she left, and with the absence of the young people and the crisis of the war, the membership and interest gradually diminished. After the young people returned from the war, it was difficult to attempt to re-capture their previous interest after what they had been through, and consequently the Club dissolved.

The Altar Rosary Society now comprising approximately seventy members is celebrating its twenty-second year of spiritual, financial and social service to St. Alphonsus. Membership is open to all women of the parish to enjoy the meetings held the second Monday of each month from September through June, to gain spiritual strength through corporate communion, to recite the rosary, to hold the May crownings, and to give consolation to the deceased. 

This Club contributed financially and physically to the maintenance of the church from money derived from their social affairs, their Annual Outing and outstanding St. Patrick's Dance. They designed the grotto, purchased the Tennessee stone, and erected the grotto, which was completed in 1956. This Club was very active until it was dissolved in 1962.

CONFRATERNITY OF CHRISTIAN DOCTRINE

SISTER ANTHONY MARIE, presently stationed at St. Joseph's Convent, Lancaster, Pa., served at St. Michael's Home from 1970-1973 as Superior of the Convent and as Principal of the school. In 1972 with the assistance of two Franciscan nuns, she set up a training program for teachers of Christian Doctrine. Each of the nuns taught two classes from the first through the sixth grades. In the evenings Sister conducted junior high school classes.

The following year CCD classes were conducted for juniors and seniors at the Incarnation School on Pennington Road, and in 1974 Sister taught the confirmation class of ninety-four pupils. In 1975-1976 Sister held the CCD classes at the Hopewell Public School, with the assistance of ten lay co-workers. Father Clancy, the instructors and the pupils were indeed sorry when Sister informed them that she was being transferred to Lancaster. Mr. James Gilligan then assumed the duties of Sister Anthony Marie.

Early this year Mr. Douglas Haefner replaced Mr. Gilligan and started serving this parish on a part-time basis as co-ordinator in the field of religious education. Mr. Haefner worked with the CCD faculty and parish in developing a parish program of religious education. There were thirty First Communicants in May, and the Sacrament of Confirmation was administered to a class of seventy-five by Auxiliary Bishop John C. Reiss during the month of May.

Mr. Haefner has been replaced by Sister Mary Fink, who assumed her duties as a full time co-ordinator in the religious field in August. For the past five years Sister Mary has been the CCD director for the parish at St. Gertrude's in Lebanon, Pa., and also as a Eucharistic minister taking communion to the elderly and infirm, and also visiting those who had become lax in their Catholic duties and obligations. Sister Mary is well remembered by many of our parishioners as having served at St. Michael's Home for sixteen years as house mother and teacher.

Sister Mary Fink, with the aid of Mr. Gilligan and the coworkers will continue with the work so ably initiated by her predecessors.
